Taking its name from Julian Avenue in Acton, in the autumn of 1948 rehearsals started for the Society's first show "lolanthe" - so this is our 70th Anniversary Year and welcome to our 97th production - HMS Pinafore.

For the first 25 years the Society put on two shows every year – such was the popularity of the Gilbert & Sullivan operas then, but now an annual production is the best we can economically do. The shows remain fun

to do and the society believes the operas deserve to be properly performed with a live orchestra. Unfortunately this comes at a cost and, with demographic changes and declining audiences combined with a limit on what can be realistically charged for tickets, this has led to financial problems.

We are however extremely grateful to the wide support, acknowledged elsewhere in this programme, given to us for this production. It is a strange phenomenon that the public will come to the popular G&S operas like *The Mikado* and *The Pirates of Penzance* but shun those such as *Patience* and *Princess Ida* that we have recently done, yet these are musically delightful. Anyway *HMS Pinafore* is usually high in the popularity stakes and I am sure this production will not disappoint.

Fraser Grant again directs and we are pleased to welcome back Jack Wong as Musical Director for his second show with us. His orchestra is made up of young musicians from London Music Colleges where this production gives useful experience in the operatic field.

Last year's show - Patience - was very successful and again received NODA awards. The show itself was awarded best Gilbert & Sullivan in the NODA London District 2 and Ian Henderson was awarded best male actor for his performance as Grosvenor.

As always the production credits in the programme are extensive and we are extremely appreciative of the work undertaken by everyone supporting those on stage.

New members are always welcome – in all voice ranges. Previous experience is not required. THE PLOT

Act One

Ralph has fallen in love with Josephine, the daughter of his commanding officer, Captain Corcoran. Likewise, Little Buttercup, has fallen in love with the Captain himself. Class pride, however, stands in the way. The Captain has, in fact, been arranging a marriage between his daughter and Sir Joseph Porter, First Lord of the Admiralty, who is of the social class above even the Corcorans.

The sailors are merrily preparing the ship for Sir Joseph's inspection. The generally happy atmosphere on deck is marred only by Little Buttercup's hints of a dark secret she is hiding, by the misanthropic grumbling of Dick Deadeye, and by the love-lorn plaints of Ralph and Josephine. Sir Joseph appears, attended by his lady relatives, and explains how he became Lord of the Admiralty and examines the crew, rather patronizingly. Like the Captain, he is very punctilious, demanding polite diction among the sailors at all times.

Josephine finds him insufferable. When Ralph again pleads his suit and finally threatens suicide, she agrees to elope. The act ends with the general rejoicing of the sailors at Ralph's sucess; only Dick Deadeye croaks his warning that their hopes will be frustrated.

Act Two

Act 2 opens with the Captain in despair at the demoralization of his crew and the coldness of his daughter towards Sir Joseph. Little Buttercup tries to comfort him, and foretells a change in store. But Sir Joseph soon appears and tells the Captain that Josephine has thoroughly discouraged him in his suit; he wishes to call the match off.

The Captain suggests that perhaps his daughter feels herself inferior in social rank to Sir Joseph, and should be reassured. This Sir Joseph does, not realizing that his words are as applicable to Josephine and Ralph as they are to himself and Josephine. He thinks that she accepts him, whereas actually she is reaffirming her acceptance of Ralph. They all join in a happy song.

Meanwhile, Dick Deadeye has made his way to the Captain, and informs him of the planned elopement of his daughter with Ralph. The Captain whereupon intercepts the elopers and, cries "Damne!" when he learns of their planned marriage. Unfortunately, Sir Joseph and his relatives hear him and are horrified at his swearing; Sir Joseph sends him to his cabin in disgrace. But when Sir Joseph also learns from Ralph that Josephine was eloping, he angrily orders Ralph put in irons.

Little Buttercup now comes out with her secret, which solves the whole difficulty: she confesses that many years ago she had charge of nursing and bringing up Ralph and the Captain when they were babies. Inadvertently, she got them mixed up; so the one who now was Ralph really should be the Captain and vice-versa. This error is immediately rectified. The sudden reversal in the social status of Ralph and the Corcorans removes Sir Joseph as a suitor for Josephine's hand and permits her to marry Ralph, and her father to marry Buttercup. Sir Joseph resigns himself to marrying his cousin, Hebe.

Philip Lewis - Sir Joseph Porter

Ah Sir Joseph Porter; like many self made men, he believes it is his duty to impart the story of his rise to greatness to lesser mortals (whether they want to hear it or not!). Like many current day celebrities, he takes around with him a substantial entourage, who are there to boost his ego and tend to his needs. It is an irony that his pseudo harem of sisters, cousins and aunts provides him with little comfort, perhaps marriage will let him be rid of them. Mysteriously

he plies his suit with a humble Captain's daughter, whose tastes, by her father's admission "are mean and flighty." Will his rank, wealth and political status, and official utterances provide him happiness? It is not unlikely (or is it!).

Peter Edwards - Captain Corcoran

Well, what is the latest title for Peter Edwards? Previous titles have included God (Jupiter in *Orpheus in the Underworld* 2005), Lord Tolloler (*Iolanthe* 2010), Emperor (*Mikado* 2014), Sergeant of Police (*Pirates* 2004 and "thoroughly wound up" 2015), King (*Princess Ida* 2016) and a Colonel (*Patience* 2017). It's full steampunk ahead for Peter and full circle as he's having a second shot at Captain Corcoran having played him in our 2008 production of *HMS Pinafore*.



Robert Brown - Ralph Rackstraw



Robert is delighted to be making his debut with Julian Light playing his favourite G&S tenor role (this is the fourth incarnation of Ralph in 10 years). He has played most of the tenor and some of the high baritone G&S roles (some of them more than once) and only has to appear in *The Grand Duke* to complete the set. Away from G&S Robert has played many various characters ranging from a sullen teenager in *Habeas Corpus*, an outraged scout leader in *Confusions* to a blind coffin bearer in *The Visit*. He has also appeared in many musicals most

recently as Perchick in Fiddler on the Roof and Nicely-Nicely in Guys and Dolls.

James Naylor - Dick Deadeye

James is a choral director, community practitioner and G&S enthusiast who is new to JLOS and to London. He was the music director of the University of Birmingham G&S society, while he completed his Master's in Choral Conducting. He is now music director of Waltham Forest Community Choir and of community opera group the Wilmore Singers. This is his second outing with HMS Pinafore, and his first production with JLOS, as a last minute addition to the principal cast. Previous roles include Pooh-Bah in The Mikado and the Usher in Trial by Jury.


Murray Langton - Bob Becket




Cora Hardy - Josephine

Since being seduced with the promise of sparkly fairy wings in lolanthe at age 13, Cora has performed all the G&S operettas with various groups, most recently Cambridge University G&S, and this is her fourth Pinafore (though last time, as assistant producer, she gave up the boards for the lighting desk). When not singing choruses in public, Cora plays at being a real adult by not microwaving every meal and pretending to have an opinion on wines. She also occasionally does some law.



HMS Pinafore was Cheryl's very first Gilbert and Sullivan in a school performance at the age of 12. That sparked a life-long interest in operetta in general and G&S in particular. She has done *Pingfore* many times since, including Josephine and Buttercup, but she has never played Hebe before and is very much looking forward to it.

Fraser Grant - Director

Fraser Grant studied French at Edinburgh University, and then went on to train as a director at Drama Studio, London. He has a very busy freelance directing career, working mainly in Opera. He is also Head of Drama at Harvington Prep. School in Ealing, and was Head of Drama at the LCM Junior College from 1998-2012. As a Theatre Director he has directed many productions including A Midsummer Night's Dream, The Tempest, Abigail's Party, The Wanderer, Broken Glass, The Importance of Being Earnest and The Threepenny Opera. He directed the Scottish premiere of Sondheim's Into The Woods and has won several

awards for Best Production on the Edinburgh Fringe. He has also worked extensively in Italy where he has directed touring productions of *A Midsummer Night's Dream, The Tempest, Twist and Shout, The Beatles' Story, Jekyll and Hyde, Romeo and Juliet, A Christmas Carol, The Blues Brothers, Comedy of Errors and Hamlet.* As a lyricist, he has written many songs for the cabaret duo OperaTottie, and has translated *The Magic Flute, Cosi Fan Tutte, La Cenerentola, Fidelio, La Boheme, Die Fledermaus, Orpheus in the Underworld* and *La Belle Hélène*. He is now almost exclusively a director of Opera and has directed most of the operas in the popular canon. This is his 21st production for JLOS.



Jack Wong - Musical Director

Jack Wong began his piano studies at the age of five and violin studies at the age of eight. Jack graduated at the Royal Academy of Music with a first class honours bachelor degree in Violin Performance and he is now studying at the Guildhall School of Music & Drama on the Opera Repetiteur course with a full scholarship. Jack is currently the resident music scholar of the Robert Anderson Research Charitable Trust. He is the artistic director and conductor of Hornton Chamber Orchestra, an ensemble he founded in 2015 with students

from London conservatoires.

Most notable achievements include third prize winner in the International Concerto Competition – debut at the Berlin Philharmonic Hall conducting category and gave his Berlin debut with Eurasia Chamber Orchestra at the French Cathedral. He is also the third prize winner of the Pancho Vladigerov International Violin Competition. Jack has also taken part in the Chipping Campden International Music Festival for two consecutive years, and performs with the London Symphony Orchestra String Academy, as well as the International Schleswig-Holstein Music Festival Orchestra Academy in Germany. He recently took part in the Verbier Festival Conductor Mentorship Programme where he assisted conductors such as Valery Gergiev.

BAB BITES



Pinafore opened at the Opera Comique on May 25th 1878

It began in Gilbert's earlier works including his Bab Ballads

It was written in the early months of 1878, starting with song lyrics

G & S travelled to Portsmouth on April 13th 1878 to get ideas from ships of the British Navy including HMS Thunderer and HMS Victory

Gilbert ordered the costumes from a tailor in Portsmouth who supplied the Navy

Gilbert intended to create a British man-of-war on stage, cf JLOS's 2008 production!
