CHAIRMAN'S NOTES



Welcome to *The Pirates of Penzance* – our 94^{th} production since the Society's first show in 1949.

In early life, Gilbert worked as a barrister, and his experiences of the law are reflected in several of his comic operas, obviously *Trial by Jury* and particularly *Iolanthe*. Few, however, would include *The Pirates of Penzance* in that category, but many people today continue to suffer

from the small print in contract conditions that plagues almost any transaction.

So loose wording in the opera, when the Young Frederic, born on leap year day February 29, is apprenticed as a trainee Pirate until his twenty-first birthday rather than his twenty-first year, means he is tied to the Pirate band until 29 February 1940! This is where we commence our story in this production, but traditionalists can be assured that not a note of music is changed and the libretto is rigidly adhered to.

Fraser Grant again directs and we welcome Harry Ogg as musical director. Paul Smith, who has looked after our music for the last 10 years, has had to bid au revoir after recently accepting a regular contract with P & O Cruises for his and Carolyn Allen's Opera Tottie cabaret show. So we are very grateful to Harry for taking this on at relatively short notice.

We also welcome to the company for this production Guy Withers playing Frederic, Stephanie Lomax sharing the role of Mabel, and Sarah Joseph as Edith.

As always the production credits in the programme are extensive, and we are extremely appreciative of the work undertaken by everyone supporting those on stage.

Taking its name from Julian Avenue in Acton, the Society has provided a platform for light opera in Ealing since 1948. We appreciate the support of our Patrons and of those who attend our shows regularly - if you are not on our mailing list, and wish to join this, or become a Patron, give your name with email address to a steward.

THE PLOT

Act One

On the 28th of February 1940, a young boy is evacuated to Penzance in Cornwall to escape the terror of the Blitz. Alone and afraid in his new home, he discovers a book about pirates and stays up all night to read it. At midnight...heralding the start of the 29th of February, the dolls and toys of the room suddenly come to life and whisk the young lad into a wonderful and exciting adventure...

It is approaching mid-day and the Pirates offer a toast to Frederic who is celebrating his $21^{\rm st}$ birthday and the end of his apprenticeship. As a lad, Frederic was supposed to have been apprenticed as a PILOT, but his nursery maid Ruth, being hard of hearing, apprenticed him to a PIRATE in error.

The pirates don't seem to make piracy pay – Frederic points out to his boss, the Pirate King, that they never attack a weaker party than themselves, and let ships that are manned by orphans go unharmed, because they are all orphans themselves.

Ruth longs for Frederic to take her with him when he leaves the Pirates, but they are disturbed by the arrival of a group of ladies, and Frederic is captivated by one of them — Mabel. As he is due to leave the Pirates shortly and thus has no loyalty to them, he feels he can warn the ladies that there are nasty Pirates about. However, he is too late and the Pirates seize the ladies with an eye to matrimony!

The ladies are all daughters of a Major-General Stanley, and he pleads with the Pirate King to release them – he claims to be an orphan. Never molesting an orphan, the pirates consequently release the ladies, and Frederic – ignoring the pleas of Ruth - is free to marry Mabel.

Act Two

The Major-General believes his lie about being an orphan has shamed the family name and he fears for the consequences. Frederic will soon march against the Pirates supported by the Police.

Ruth and the Pirate King explain that that although Frederic is twenty-one, as he was born in a leap year on 29th February, he is officially only five. As he was committed as a pirate until he reaches his 21st birthday on 29th February 1940, he remains bound to them, under his sense of duty, for some time yet. On learning that the Major-General's story is a lie, Frederic, although friendly with Mabel, feels compelled to tell the Pirate King of the Major-General's deception because he is a slave of duty. The pirates set out to get revenge on the Major-General.

A fight ensues, which the pirates win. The Sergeant of Police, however, implores the pirates to yield in the Queen's name. Ruth reveals that the pirates are all noble men who love their Queen, so the Major-General relents and allows them to marry his daughters.

As the dolls vanish, the young boy closes the book and falls fast asleep. After all it was only a dream. Wasn't it?

Peter Edwards - Sergeant of Police

Having got a (mock) Oscar in our Ealing Studios-themed *Mikado* last year - alas just as a prop for his title role - this year Peter is part of the Cornish constabulary. This is Peter's second time as the Sergeant and now he is thoroughly wound-up!





Stephanie Lomax - Mabel

This is Stephanie's fourth G&S in just over a year, having previously sung Aline in *The Sorcerer* (Hounslow Light Opera Company), Phyllis in *Iolanthe* (Richmond Choral Society) and Casilda in *The Gondoliers* (Chapel End Savoy Players). In December she will be playing Cupid in Handel's *Semele* with Isleworth Baroque. In her spare time Stephanie moonlights as a Government lawyer.

Carly Hilts - Kate

This is Carly's fourth *Pirates of Penzance*. Gilbert and Sullivan initially took over her life at Cambridge University, where she studied Anglo-Saxon, Norse, and Celtic in between performing with their G&S Society, and after moving to London she joined Julian Light Operatic Society (chorus, *The Gondoliers*; Léona, *La Belle Helene*; Peep-Bo, *The Mikado*;) and Wimbledon Light Opera Society (Shprintze, *Fiddler on the Roof*; chorus, *The Mikado*). More recently she has performed in Imperial Productions' *Iolanthe*, KCL G&S Society's *Mikado*, King's



Alumni Light Opera Society's *Princess Ida*, and New London Opera Group's *Pirates* (all chorus). In real life she is Assistant Editor of *Current Archaeology* magazine.

Helen Gargan - Isabel

This is Helen's eighth 'outing' with the Julian and what fun she has had! The role of Isabel is a small and select one, but she has enjoyed the opportunity to speak in role, for as her friends will tell you, she is not the quietest of people and talking is something she loves to do!

Fraser Grant - Director



Fraser Grant studied French at Edinburgh University, and then went on to train as a Director at Drama Studio, London. He has a very busy freelance directing career, working mainly in Opera. He is also Head of Drama at Harvington Prep. School in Ealing, and was Head of Drama at the LCM Junior College from 1998-2012.

As a Theatre Director he has directed many productions including A Midsummer Night's Dream, The Tempest, Abigail's Party, The Wanderer, Broken Glass, The Importance of Being

Earnest and The Threepenny Opera. He directed the Scottish premiere of Sondheim's Into The Woods and has won several awards for Best Production on the Edinburgh Fringe. He has also worked extensively in Italy where he has directed touring productions of A Midsummer Night's Dream, The Tempest, Twist and Shout, The Beatles' Story, Jekyll and Hyde, Romeo and Juliet, A Christmas Carol, The Blues Brothers, Comedy of Errors and Hamlet

As a lyricist, he has written many songs for the cabaret duo OperaTottie, and has translated *The Magic Flute, Cosi Fan Tutte, La Cenerentola, Fidelio, La Boheme, Die Fledermaus, Orpheus in the Underworld* and *La Belle Hélène*.

He is now almost exclusively a director of Opera and has directed most of the operas in the popular canon. Recent work includes a highly acclaimed production and new translation of *Cosi Fan Tutte* for Oyster Opera at Jackson's Lane Theatre, *Il Trovatore, Carmen, Madam Butterfly, Nabucco* and *Orpheus in the Underworld* for Opera South East. This is his 18th production for JLOS.

Harry Ogg - Musical Director



Harry Ogg is a conductor based in London, and graduated from Clare College, Cambridge, in 2012. Recent work has included conducting *The Turn of the Screw*/Britten at Opera Holland Park, conducting The Hallé in recordings of works by Britten for NMC and working as the Head of Music Staff and Assistant Conductor for ETO's Spring 2014 Tour. Harry is Artistic Director of the London based orchestra Sinfonia d'Amici, with whom he has conducted over 30 performances in London and France. He has assisted Sir Mark Elder, Steuart

Bedford, Stuart Stratford, Martin Yates, Sir Richard Armstrong and Libor Pešek. Recent projects included conducting performances of Opera della Luna's production of *Orpheus in the Underworld* at The Lowry, Manchester, in September 2015.
